

Aff' Justitiarij the Justice Aire, or Court of Justiciary contains  
the Forms of proceeding in that Court; whence the Judges Rebulant  
itinerare per Regnum for the Administration of Justice.

Statuta Wilhelmi Regini. Nephew to K. David 1 who began to reign  
in the year 1165 and reigned 19 Years. These (Cap. 15 & 16) speak of Pro  
and Water ordal as Tryals still in Fashion.

Leges Forrestarum, which are ascribed to the foresaid R. Willm. are  
in an MS. Manuscript belonging to Sir David Lindsay of Dixel one  
of the Senators of the College of Justices. But Mr Robert Burnet,  
Draf. ad Cray. Feud. Lib. I says the Author of them is not certainly known.

Statuta Alexandri 2 Son. to K. William, which begin at 1649 in  
first Year of his Reign.

Statuta prima Roberti 1 Son. to Robert Bruce Earl of Carrick  
and Nephew to Robert Bruce who contended with John Balliol for the  
Crown of Scotland. He was descended of Iwan Earl of Huntington  
Brother to K. Malcolm 4 and to K. William, and began to reign Anno  
1306. Statuta secunda Rob. 1. Some of the chapters wherof are lost at a venture.

Statuta Davidis 2 Son to K. Robert 1. who began to reign in  
the year 1360.

Statuta Roberti 2 who was the first King of the Surname of  
Stewart. He was son of Walter Stewart and Marjorie Bruce Daughter  
to K. Robert 1 and half Sister by the Father's Side to K. David 2.

Statuta Roberti 3 otherwise called John, Son to Robert 2 whom  
the Nobility caused to assume the Name of Robert thinking John, as he  
was called before when Earl of Carrick, an unhappy Name, for that  
Kings of France and England of that Name had been taken captives  
in Cottel. Whence he was commonly called Robert, John, Fernxier  
i.e. the former year.

It is true of all the 16 Books aforesaid, Leges Malcolmi, Re-  
giam Majestatem, Quoniam Attachiamenta and Leges Burgorum only  
are expressly termed Books of our Law. But in one Statute (Act 115. Par.  
14. f. 3.) a Commission being granted to reduce and put into one Volume,  
the Kings Laws, Regiam Majestatem, Acts Statutes and other Books;  
the Words Acts Statutes and other Books, we may probably under-  
stand the Laws of Malcolmi, Quoniam Attachiamenta, Burrow Laws,  
Statuta Gilde and others aforesaid, now subjoined to the printed Regiam  
Majestatem. There are a great many manuscript copies of Regiam Majestatem, either of  
some books other Law tract abridged to them than acts Regis mentioned which are taken, noted  
of by the Bishop of Carlisle in his Scottish Historical Library pag. 262 of 1799. and by Doctor

All our mercant Laws hit K. James the firsts time, were written  
and published in the Latin Tongue. Because they were penned by  
Clergy-men, who, being Secretaries to the Prince of their ancient  
Confession, desired to maintain the Popes and their own unpopu-  
lar Authority by continuing both King and people in Ignorance.  
But seeing Laws cannot profit those who are ignorant of them, by  
Sir John Boileau of Garsfield the Merch. Pe-  
peler of K. James 6. Sir John Boileau of Garsfield was in the  
register translated and published these old Books of our Laws in the  
Scottish Language, and also published them in Latin with his own  
Notes, wherein he frequently quotes the old Tongue and Latin of  
Scottish Translation and allows it to be next easier. But some of his  
Annotations seem to have been penned in French. By an unprinted  
Act of the 19 Parliament of K. James 6. anno 1597 Sir John  
was allowed and encouraged to print the said Laws, in Latin &  
Money was ordered to be paid to him by that King by the Presidents  
Barons, Lords and Barons. There are two Treatises belonging to the  
Scottish Translation of these old Laws, one concerning the Power of  
Proceeding before the Lord of Council and Session, and the other  
of Crimes and Judgments in criminal causes.
