

That the persons accused have the Devil's mark upon
 some part of their bodies, is an ordinary article in the
 of witchcraft; but never sustained Relevant with us; /
 but they confess that they got such a mark with their
 own Conscience, which is Equivalent to a Covenant with
 Devil. Mentioned from. part 1. Tit. 10. 57. And this a Person's
 Confession and he confess that he did well with her. And
 if she be other ways of a sound Judgement, may, when
 found with other probabilities, go far to Justify this finding
 Yet that is hardly Relevant for M. Henr. id. 520.
 Nor is it all together Relevant to find a Criminal fact
 that the person accused by amorous practices induced
 men or women to Lovers; because the grounds whereupon
 it is said tends (that the Devil may Excite and form
 the passion of love, are too Conjectural. M. Henr. id.
 521. Witches have been tried in other places upon
 their publick bad fame. De Cis. b. 6. 3. fol. 3. But Gra-
 matus a Neapolitan Senator (Invent. 42 n. 8) says, that
 in all his life he never saw a trial where in such pu-
 blic fame was proved, because of the many things re-
 quired to sustain it. And with us General Description
 of a person as a Witch, is Never Relevant unto the trial
 for that crime. M. Henr. id. 512. It hath indeed been
 sustained Relevant when joined with some one par-
 ticular Relevant Article of witchcraft. 20 March
 1622 Margaret Wallard 20 December 1644 Agnes
 Ginnid. Which it was good for the Judges to do, ex-
 plaining what it of itself Relevant, wants not the Con-
 science of Common sense to make it so. But sometimes
 and with more Reason to, Articles of themselves
 Relevant, are sustained Relevant when joined
 with common fame and Reputation of witchcraft

 It Woman was adjudged to be burnt for Consulting and
 having with Witches for a Remedy to keep a breeding
 Woman from Vomiting, and for Enquiring at a Woman
 etc. if the King would come home or not. 10 May 1591. Berbra
 Napi. Consulting with a notorious Witch (whom the Bon
 Fuller knew to be such) for the loss of a sudden great pike
 wher which the person Consulting by her wiles of fellowship
 upon him other, was found Relevant to her the pain of
 death 20 March 1622. Margaret Wallard. But it was not
 found Relevant per se, that a woman had been for eight
 or nine years a Common Consultant with Witches; and
 a factor of Help and Response from them for Destroy-
 ing and curing diverse persons. That being too General
 without specifying the Names of those hurt and cured,
 or the time and place when and where such a thing
 was done; or the manner how, and that the general
 knew the persons applyed to, to be witches. 20 March
 1622 Margaret Wallard.

Having thus far proceeded in his enquiry of
 witchcraft, it might be expected, that after breaching
 of what is Relevant to infer that friends & friends ex-
 plain the proofs that used to be produced against you
 and charged with the guilt of it, but before I go to those
 a Commonwealth concerning the Being of witches, lies
 in the way to be Disengaged.

Wherfore it is Observed, that there have
 been and may be Witches; and the General
 Reasons of those who think otherwise
 are Examined.

It is one of the singularities in witchcraft beyond
 all other Crimes that few persons (who may apprehend
 by what they observe, to be true and
 sufficient) that surpass the Utmost bounds of Nature.
