

Counterfeiting letters of Indemnition as graffed the first,
hanged with the false letters about his Neck 3 July 1655
Robert Canning. One forging or caufing forge fulfyllyng
to a bond of Cautionry, or his Actualy giving into

Adam. Forging or Counterfeiting a Receipt of poifon al
done by Another, or fcaudalout ifing such Receipt
or being art and part therof, was fcaustained to infer the
pain of death 25 January 1694 Daniel Nicollion & John
Maxwell. A Notary for giving out two different Extr
of one poifon and for purveying ad a witness before the po
ison 20 December 1616 Alexander Rock. Another for Con
terfeiting and fulfyllyng a fellow of a leach affil
was Dead and purveying himfelf 19 November 1617 Mr
John Muirhead. Two poifond for forging and uifing po
is November 1677 Captain Arthur food and Mr. Mr
Arthur food. One guilty as art and part Accesory and
other of his false bonds and a false Contract 12 March 16
Alexander Kennedy. Other for Counterfeiting a Discharge
4 Feb 1597 James Ralday & other. And one for Counter
feiting bonds 20 Shillings Sterling Notes of the Bank
of Scotland 19 Oct 1626 Robert G. Canning, were all
adjudged to be hanged. If poifon was hanged without
paper on his Breast getting forth his Brains for
fulfyllyng a Discharge and a bond 8 June 1650 William
Blair. And one was hanged for Counterfeiting
Another Subſcription to a false bond of Power for

2 April 1620 Thomas Dampster. But at the fame time after
all I cannot help thinking Sir George Milnes of Brimpart
2 Git 27 is miſtake in aborting, that upon a Verdict fin
ding one guilty of forgyry in the poul of a Bancket of fyngers
bation of the Lord of fpoſions the Justices ar tied Expreſſly
to Condemn him to be hanged. For there are fewe
ſtaues in the Booke of a journal, wherupon ſuch a Ver
dict they adjudged the pannel only to an arbitra ry puniſh
ment. And one who was both a Maſtonger and Notary
was ordained to be forgyred and Depriv'd of his office for
Counterfeiting Charges and Committals of burning 28 March
1603 William Strachan. A Notary for forgying a Charter that
Draſed to be Draſed from his office, ſet on the Market
Broſt with a paper on his forehead ſignifying his Crime
and banished 20 July 1638 William Morfy the Another Not
ary for uifing falſe wittneſſe without knowing them to be falſe, was
adjudged to be Infamous, to leave his ear Raſted to the trone
with a paper on his breaſt Declaring the Reaſon of bring
ing him thare, and to be banished, ult. 1650 Thomas
Lawfor. A ffayff Clerk who forgyed a Discharge and purveyed
himſelf in his trial and Examination thereto, was
ordained to be Infamous, Depriv'd and ſeacapeable of his
office, to ſtan on the Market Broſt with a paper on his
head ſignifying his offence, and to be banished during
all the days of his life time, and his Movables to be
Escheat to the King 2 Feb 1636 Thomas McEwan. But it
was not ſustained Rellevant to Mark the forger of a
Receipt and the fulfyllyng of the Counterfeitor al a fee
perch in Scotland, ſubject to punishment conform to the
law of Scotland 16 July 1576 Alexander Camſay. In the
poul by the Union Cart. 6 & 18 Scotland is under the fame
prohibition and reſtrictions and limitations of tradional
England, and the law of England Imposing a leſſer
punishment than what is inflicted by the law of Scotland
and being made a ſound ex poſt facto that leſſer pain
