

in Italy and afterwards at peruzium; which he explained in his Immenso Commentaries with so much judgment in regard to his age, being then but 46 years old that he is celebrated by all men as the best expositor of the Justinian Law since the days of Accursius and all the Doctors agree us that his skill in the Law was so wonderfully great that by a great felicity of parts he far exceeded all others...

And thus the Justinian Law appearing to be a much better Law than the Laws of the barbarous nations had not only spread itself within the bounds of the Alps, but it soon past over those Hills and began by degrees to be introduced into the several universities of France and Germany...

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This Supreme Court was formerly held in the Imperial palace. But in the year 1495 the Imperial Chamber was settled at rosmos: but by a subsequent constitution this court is now settled at spire, unto which all the Electors pines and subjects of the Empire yield obedience as to a court of Honor.

own Law as being very good thereof and this Law in a great measure prevails in the territories of Lusatia, Silesia, Brandenburg, Prussia, Pomerania, and Hessia. And out of the Empire the Pope and Lithuanians have made a very antient but continued an unwritten Law for a long time until he came a Republic...

unto the Roman Law, and as they now regard their civil Liberties as the property of the Roman Emperors so they now always make use of their own Laws, which are made by the Doctors, but that the practice is governed by customs and immemorial Law, and yet in some parts is governed by the Law of nature or nations...

The Great Britain is divided from other parts of the world by the Sea; so likewise it is divided from all other European nations by the practice of its Laws, our Kings having never granted so much authority to the Roman Laws to be mixed with their own as other European princes have done.
